His Royal Highness then visited Dawley Town Hall, which was laid out as a veterans' tea party, where the Duke enjoyed refreshments sitting and chatting with the veterans and members of the Royal British Legion. They discussed their contributions and current involvement with the Armed Forces Covenant and the "Calm Café" hosted fortnightly at the Town hall. Veterans described how they enjoy meeting up together on a regular basis and also to access mental health support.





The Duke was told how earlier this year over 30 High Street businesses in Dawley had signed the Armed Forces Covenant leading to the town being named the UK's first official "Armed Forces Friendly High Street". The armed forces covenant is a promise by the nation, ensuring that those who serve or have served in the armed forces and their families, are treated fairly. It is estimated that Telford has an armed forces community of around 20,000 residents, some of whom were able to showcase their work to his Royal Highness. The Duke also met some of the Defence Employer Recognition Scheme Gold and Silver award holders from the Telford and Wrekin area which included Dawley Council.











Coincidentally the Town Hall was celebrating its 150-year anniversary as a much-loved and very well used venue, so it was a fitting end to the visit when the Duke unveiled a plaque commemorating his visit. It was a wonderful day, and the visit was appreciated by so many people who got the chance to meet and talk with the Duke.
