Consequently, we held our first Buckingham Palace-style Garden party in 2022 and this year, Peter and Sarah Holt were kind enough to offer their beautiful home to repeat the event. Over five hundred guests attended, mostly nominated by their Town or Parish Council for their contribution to their community.

Inevitably such events take many months to plan, from raising thousands of pounds from our generous sponsors, representing both local and national businesses, to ensuring sufficient cakes! I am indebted to the team of Deputy Lieutenants, led by Claire Crackett MBE DL, who once again delivered a wonderful event, where we were able to recognise some of the outstanding volunteers, from all walks of life and from right across the county, who had one thing in common their tireless support of Shropshire residents and organisations within their communities. ROYAL GARDEN PARTIES

Each year His Majesty The King holds two garden parties at Buckingham Palace where guests are invited in recognition of their contribution in their communities. This year a third party was arranged with a special theme of “Education” giving the opportunity for the King to formally recognise the challenges faced by and commitment of teachers throughout the country. Guests at all three parties this year enjoyed beautiful sunny weather.



KING'S AWARD FOR ENTERPRISE

You may have seen the official announcement back in May, when the KAE awards were announced, that two Shropshire businesses had been recognised by His Majesty The King. This is the most prestigious award given to the UK's top businesses. THE KING'S AWARD FOR VOLUNTARY SERVICE

As you may recall this is the highest award given to voluntary organisations, the equivalent of the MBE for the voluntary sector. The awards are hugely coveted as they represent recognition, by His Majesty The King, of the extraordinary work recipient organisations are doing in their local communities. The actual awards are announced each year on the King's birthday in November and presenting the awards is one of the most important and joyful events in my calendar. Although most of the awards are presented between December and April a small number of organisations delay the actual presentation until a key moment in their year.

SHREWSBURY & OSWESTRY CRUCIAL CREW

Established in 1994, this wonderful group run an annual event over a two-week period at The Flaxmill in Shrewsbury. This is attended by up to 1560 children from 40 to 60 primary schools in the Shrewsbury and Oswestry area of Shropshire. The children receive social awareness and safety training as a means of teaching them essential life skills. Since they started over 36,700 children have attended.

Many of their volunteers attended the presentation of their crystal and certificate.



SHROPSHIRE BEEKEEPERS

On a beautiful, hot sunny day in June, I visited the Shropshire Beekeepers Association to present them with their crystal King's Award for Voluntary Service and to plant a tree to commemorate the occasion. These volunteers work to promote the craft of beekeeping, supporting beekeepers and training new beekeepers to care for and enjoy our honeybees. We are blessed having such organisations based right here in Shropshire.



CRUCKTON PLOUGHING AND HEDGING SOCIETY

Established in 1927 this organisation encourages and promotes demonstrations, competitions and social events relating to ploughing, hedging and farm management. Although their award was announced last November, the group, understandably, requested their award be presented at their annual ploughing match, so all their volunteers could be present. It was obvious that this event is a big day in the Shropshire Farming Community, and despite some challenging weather conditions, a wonderful time was had by all.

ROYAL VISITS TO THE COUNTY

On a glorious July day, we were honoured to welcome Her Royal Highness, The Princess Royal back to Shropshire. She undertook two visits, firstly, in her capacity as Patron of The Field Studies Council, she visited their headquarters at Montford Bridge, touring the extensive site, where she received briefings on what the centre offers in terms of courses and experiences for young people, including opportunities for pupils at risk of exclusion. She saw new plantings, new habitats, biodiversity and carbon initiatives.

The Princess then travelled to Stoke Heath Prison, where in her capacity as Patron of the Butler Trust, she toured parts of the prison dedicated to training and supporting inmates into employment; this included the Kitchen Garden, the woodwork and engineering workshops and the “High Street” which she officially opened.
